Over the past couple of weeks we have been able to successfully control the spread of Covid among our residents. We're grateful for the employees, residents and family members who wore their masks and took extra precautions while the region saw a spike in cases. Dare we say that brighter days are ahead? On December 10th, 2021, residents of several towns in Kentucky were stricken by life-shattering tornados leaving behind devastation. Sadly, most lost everything that they knew including household belongings and basic necessities. Amy Bittner, PTA and Director of Rehab for Vitality to You with Genesis Rehab, heard a local organization getting involved and knew it was time to be a good neighbor. Amy's in-laws and neighbors were working tirelessly to collect as much as possible to make an impact on the devastation. Heritage

Baptist Church, a local denomination in Jeanette, was seeking donations of gently used clothing, shoes, blankets, diapers, and wipes, any non-perishable items, to send to families affected by the tornados. Amy acted as a middleman between those who donated items at Redstone and Heritage Baptist Church who was sending the donations to Kentucky. Amy started collecting donations on December 20th, 2021 and it didn't take her long to fill up by December 23rd. In all, a semi-tractor trailer and an additional truck were filled from top to bottom and front to back with items to be sent. The truck arrived in Kentucky during the week of January 2nd, 2022 and quickly started to distribute the collected items to those in need. Amy says about helping others, "Be kind, compassionate and helpful to others, it's a great legacy to leave behind." Amy was able to completely fill her jeep 2 times solely from donations at Redstone. The garden on campus has grown delicious eats like the zucchini that was picked and fried



by dining to enjoy over a happy hour and fresh sliced green peppers to dip in ranch. George's hope is to start a gardening club for everyone to enjoy.
