### **Resident Spotlight: Bonnie Mochan**

For Murrysville resident Bonnie Mochan, piano has always been an irresistible passion. Bonnie started in music as a violinist at age 7, encouraged by her mother to practice violin diligently. This eventually lead her to play in the orchestra and land a seat as a lead violinist, where she says she really learned music. After graduating from the eighth grade, Bonnie stopped playing violin in pursuit of her true passion for piano. She recollects a player piano her grandmother had in the house. She would sit at the piano as the music rolls turned, pretending that she was the one playing the song. Her mother, also a pianist, taught her the C scale which gave Bonnie the drive she needed to really start practicing substantial piano skills. Bonnie's stepfather introduced a piano into the home, which she would find herself practicing on often. She even managed to make time for her piano while studying for both her Master's degree and Ph.D., saying it was her escape from some pretty intense study sessions. Bonnie took piano lessons, but her ability truly came from how much she loved music and practiced skills on her own. After suffering a stroke in 2018, Bonnie decided she needed an activity to exercise her brain. She decided she would return to taking piano lessons, joking that at the time she was her piano teacher's oldest pupil. Bonnie currently practices once a week, after attending Sunday service. She dedicates up to three hours at a time of practicing musical scales and a few songs, with Opus 10 by Chopin being her favorite piece to recite. If you're lucky, you may catch Bonnie with her keyboard headphones unplugged practicing her lifelong passion for piano!

We are pleased to announce that 5 Star Staffing has received formal licensure from the PA Department of Health to be registered as a temporary health care staffing agency!




#### **COVID UPDATES**
